

MUSIC RESEARCH PLAN OF NEGROES

Growing out of the Exposition, as a direct result of the successful appearance made there by the San Diego-Pasadena organization of Negro singers assembled by George Garner, the Garner Foundation has been born to perpetuate Negro folk and spiritual music and to conduct research in the field of African folk lore and chants.

Garner announced yesterday that he has acquired a lot in Pasadena, and that money for buildings is assured. Prominent citizens of Pasadena, San Marino and San Diego have assured Garner funds will be forthcoming to carry on the work indefinitely.

Garner and his wife, Mrs. Paullin Garner, are well known Negro musicians. He finished his musical education in Dr. Arnold Smith's Royal College of Music, London. At the same time, Mrs. Garner finished her work in the Tobias Matthey School of Music, London. They have worked together ever since, jointly training Negro choruses.

The Ford Motor Co. is considering putting the Garner Negro chorus in the Ford music bowl when scheduled programs have been completed.

ZOO PLANS STUNTS BY ANIMALS FOR VISITORS AT EXPO

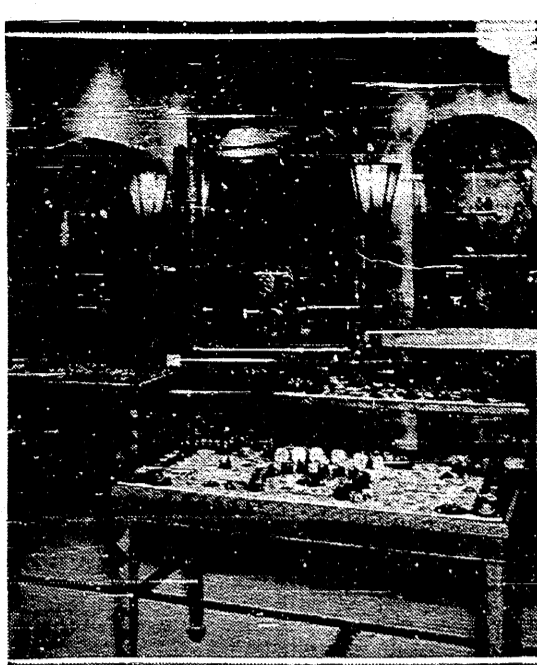

DISPLAY OF GEMS AT EXPO PRAISED BY NOTED EXPERT

"East meets west in the colorful and elaborate gem exhibit of Philip Klein at the Exposition."

Thus did Mesrob Atkian, international gem expert, describe the gem display. Atkian, in San Diego for a visit to the Exposition, was impressed by the carefully designed and attractively displayed gems that feature the exhibit in the Palace of Electricity.

"In the exhibit," Atkian said, "Philip Klein, a dealer since 1886, carries genuine stones and jewelry from the seven seas including both oriental and occidental importations. The collection of Cameos and Intaglios is particularly good."

Atkian, an Armenian jewel dealer who figured in the sale of the \$40,000 jade necklace to Prince Alexis Mdivani as a present for the former Barbara Button, was impressed by the Egyptian building displays.

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The visiting gem dealer described the Exposition as the most colorful and beautiful I have ever seen. I came to San Diego intending to stay a couple of days. I've been here two weeks and have no immediate plans to leave. Your climate is the best I've ever seen. Your city has impressed me and I plan to remain for an indefinite time."

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ORCHESTRA GROUP TO LEAVE SEATTLE FOR EXPO TODAY

SEATTLE July 22 (A.P.)—With music for their engagement filling two large packing cases, members of the Seattle symphony orchestra were preparing today to leave tomorrow for San Diego where they will give 24 concerts of two hours each at the San Diego Exposition.

Earl Cameron, conductor of the orchestra, who concluded an appearance as guest conductor of the San Francisco orchestra in San Mateo, Calif., Sunday, will meet his musicians in the south.

The first concert is scheduled for Friday. The Seattle musicians will reach the Exposition city one day in advance. They will have little time for leisure as their schedule is heavy during their engagement. Cameron has promised that few numbers will be repeated during the concert series. This will mean many days of practice for the orchestra.

Carl Rotter, 6, will be the youngest musician on the 1500-mile trip. While there will be other children along, he will be the only musician among the younger generation.

He is the son of Louis Rotter, violinist known as "the busiest man" in the orchestra, and already he knows considerable about music.

Sixty-three members of the orchestra will participate in the San Diego programs.

PYTHIAN KNIGHTS PLAN DAY AT EXPO

For the first time in the history of the organization, a class of 100, between the ages of 18 and 40 years, is to be allowed to join the Order Knights of Pythias without payment of an initiation fee.

Announcement of the opportunity was made by local officers of the lodge after issuance of a dispensation permitting the departure for the Gov. Frank F. Merriam Exposition class to be initiated Aug. 17. The initiation will feature Pythian day at the Exposition. Headlining speakers on the program will be Gov. Merriam and Fred H. Jones, Los Angeles, supreme vice chancellor. Details of the completed program will be announced later.

Also participating will be the Pythian sisters who plan initiation of the Rachel Ann Robertson Exposition class and appearance of all state officers of the organization.

Fifty students from Japanese universities will be the guests of the Exposition on Aug. 12-13. They will be brought here by the Los Angeles chamber of commerce, according to word received by Elwood T. Bailey, the hard-working Exposition vice president.

The Wesley Methodist Episcopal church choir of 56 voices, said to be the finest Negro choir in the west, will appear at the Exposition on July 25 and Aug. 18, with the George Garner Negro jubilee singers.

Georgia Hodges, as "Miss Ti-juna," was a close runner-up for the trophy and the Schumann Heink kiss awarded late Sunday afternoon to the winner of the personality contest. Miss Eugenia Abhay of 1467 Fourth ave., San Diego, was declared to be "The Spirit of San Diego," but Miss Hodges was a close second. Ruth Marshall, Helen Fitzgerald and Annette Rucci were other popular contestants.

Prof. Joseph Ballantyne of Long Beach, who brought the Mormon choir to the San Diego world's fair in 1915, will direct the 250-voice organization in a special program in the organ amphitheater July 28. A special delegation of 1000 Mormons from Los Angeles will attend this concert, and additional hundreds from Salt Lake City.
