

JAPANESE PLAN TWO FULL DAYS OF CELEBRATION

The third of the great foreign nations to stage elaborate celebrations and festivities at the Exposition will be the Japanese.

Aug. 18 has been officially designated Japanese day but on Aug. 17, the Buddhists will have their day at the fair and this probably will attract the Japanese in approximately the same numbers as will their own national day.

Ceremonies unique in the western world will mark the Japanese celebration on Aug. 18, one of universal interest, calculated to attract immense crowds of visitors of all nations.

There will be an all-day celebration with programs at the Organ amphitheater in the afternoon and evening and parade of 200 beautiful girls, bands and costumed marchers.

The preceding day, the Buddhists, as a feature of their distinctive ceremonies will scatter rhythmic dances, lotus blossoms, Buddha's emblem, on the Exposition grounds from the air and the cars and marchers in the parades.

A replica of a Buddhist shrine 15 feet high, in which an image of the great philosopher-teacher will appear, is to be erected at the Organ amphitheater where solemn Buddhist rites will be performed.

CITY STILL HOPES FOR USE OF CANAL, GOVERNMENT TOLD

The city council yesterday notified the government that it still hopes to exercise the right to use the All-American canal for transporting Colorado river water to San Diego, and at the same time asked the acting manager for specific recommendations on appointment of an engineering board to report on Colorado river water policy.

The resolution directed to the department of interior stated that the city hopes at an opportune date to submit to the people the question of ratifying a contract for participation in construction of the All-American canal. It was recommended by the manager and hydraulic engineer, who also suggest a survey board of engineers.

Councilman Wansley suggested that any survey board should confine itself to easily digested conclusions without rambling through hundreds of pages of abstruse calculations. The acting manager was asked to submit specific data on the cost of such an engineering board, the men who would compose it and the scope of the report he would expect them to furnish.

MIDGET 'VOWERS' Tiny Couple Married 40 Years

The oldest pair of married midgets in the world arrived at the Exposition last evening—Maj and Mrs. George Liable of Louisville, Ky., married more than 40 years ago and about 70 years old.

No sooner had they arrived at the Exposition Midget Village than they made inquiries as to how they could join The San Diego Union's True Vow Keeper's club. "I understand," said the tiny major, "that it is the only club of its kind in the world and that couples that have been married more than 35 years can join it.
