ENVOY OF RUSSIA LAW CLOSES SHOW, INVITED TO FAIR ALLOWS REOPENING

Alexander A. Troyanovsky, Russian ambassador to the United States, yesterday was invited by Frank G. Belcher, president of the Exposition, to visit the world's fair here. The invitation was extended by Belcher at a luncheon in San Francisco given in honor of the foreign dignitary. The Associated Press reported.

Troyanovsky, in San Francisco to greet the Soviet flyers planning a flight from Moscow to California, was asked to carry an invitation to his country to participate in the proposed 1938 exposition in San Francisco.

Belcher and Lt. Gov. George Hatfield also were honored at the luncheon. After a spokesman for the San Francisco exposition committee voiced a hope that the Soviet union would participate in the 1938 exposition, Troyanovsky said he was not in a position to speak authonitatively but added: "I am sure that my government will wish to participate and I personally shall be very happy to come here in 1938."


