NAVY ANNOUNCES PIERS, ANCHORAGE

By JERRY MacMULLEN Prospective assignments of pier and anchorage berths for the United States fleet in the concentration here from Aug. 23 to 30 were announced yesterday at naval

tration here from Aug. 23 to 30 were announced yesterday at naval headquarters.

Six heavy cruisers, instead of two as the last time, are expected to come into the inner harbor, according to the schedule of Comdr. R. P. Grayson, port director. Two of these, the Indianapolis and the Chicago, will be at piers and four at anchorages in the channel.

The U. S. S. Pennsylvania, flagship of Adm. Joseph M. Reeves, commander in chief of the United States fleet, will be placed at the north side of Pier 1 for the duration of the concentration. The U. S. S. California, battle force flagship, will anchor in the stream. Tentative plans call for berthing the Indianapolis at the north side of Broadway pier from Aug. 24 to Aug. 30 and the Chicago probably will go to the naval air station pier at North Island. Light cruisers and destroyers will annchor in the stream. In Coronado roads arrangements are being made to accommodate nine battleships, six heavy cruisers and four aircraft carriers. Vessels of the fleet train will be distributed variously in the harbor, their flagship, the U. S. S. Argonne, having been assigned to navy pier.

COMMISSION SURMARINE

The U. S. S. Potpoise, latest of the fleet type submarines, has been placed in commission at the navy yard at Portsmouth, N. H., it was reported yesterday at headquarters of 11th naval district.

The Porpoise, which will come here for duty upon completion of the shakedown cruise and acceptance trials, was laid down Oct. 27, 1933, and is the second submarine of that name. The original Porpoise was one of the old A-type vessels, finy in comparison to the modern underseas fighters.

A site has been selected for a temporary barracks in which the men employed on the project probably will be housed. The pier is to be of steel construction, with an approach section about 20 feet wide and 375 feet long and a landing section 38 feet wide and 210 feet long.
